#### The Game

The Bearcats welcome former Division III State University of New York Athletic Conference rival Buffalo State tonight in an exhibition game televised live on Time Warner Cable Sports. It is the first of eight televised regular-season games — five of which will air on Time Warner.

#### Scouting Binghamton

Binghamton, picked to finish fifth in the America East Coaches' Preseason Poll, returns two starters and seven letterwinners from a 14-16 team of a year ago. The Bearcats, who made a three-game improvement in league play from the previous season, welcome eight newcomers to the floor in 2008-09. The most prominent first-year Bearcats are junior point guard Emanuel Mayben, junior guard D.J. Rivera and senior forward Sean Watson. The trio join returning starters Reggie Fuller (6.6 ppg.) and Chretien Lukusa (4.3 ppg.) and key reserves Dwayne Jackson (8.5 ppg.) and Jaan Montgomery to give second-year coach Kevin Broadus a talented and deep roster.

#### Scouting Buffalo State

Buffalo State combines seven returnees, including four who saw significant starting time, with eight new faces this season. The Bengals are looking to erase the memories of a disappointing 2007-08 season that ended with a ninth-place SUNYAC finish (8-15 overall, 5-11 SUNYAC), and saw the team fail to qualify for the conference playoffs for just the second time in school history. Among the familiar faces on this year's roster is senior Jamar Gray, who emerged as the Bengals' "go-to" player last season after transferring from Genesee Community College. Gray averaged a team-best 15.7 points-per-game in his first year with Buffalo State. Junior Antonio Samedi has developed into a legitimate presence in the paint and will look to build on his 9.0 point and 6.0 rebounds-per-game from a year ago. J.O. Lott, a junior transfer from Sullivan Community College, looks to lead a talented cast of newcomers. Lott scored 15 points and had four steals in the Bengals' first exhibition game, a 68-65 win over the University of Waterloo (Ont.).

#### Up Next: Season opener Monday vs. Mansfield

The Bearcats stay at home to open their season three nights from now. Mansfield University, members of the NCAA Division II Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, pay a visit to the Events Center. After that, BU hits the road for a tough matchup next Wednesday at Atlantic 10 foe George Washington.

#### Binghamton Preseason Notes

- Two starters and seven letterwinners return from a 14-16 team that tied for fourth (out of nine) in the America East and was eliminated in the conference tournament quarterfinals.
- Second-year coach Kevin Broadus signed with Binghamton three days after helping lead the Georgetown Hoyas to the 2007 NCAA Final Four. Broadus coached at Georgetown for three years and before that, helped build a George Washington program for three years.
- Under Broadus, Binghamton made a three-game improvement in the America East standings (9-7) and equaled the program's second-highest win percentage in seven years of Division I league play (56.3%).
- Since joining the America East in 2001, Binghamton has the third-best win percentage in league play (52%), behind only Vermont and Boston University.

# 2008-09 Men's Basketball Season Preview

Binghamton fans may have to check their roster sheets to help identify the influx of newcomers on the floor for the Bearcats this season. But given the talent level of those recruits, spectators may not want to take their eyes off the floor for too long.

After orchestrating a three-game improvement in conference play in his first season at the helm, second-year coach Kevin Broadus has bolstered his program with nine newcomers, many of whom will play key roles in the 2008-09 season.

Broadus landed four talented transfers who are slated to play significant roles immediately. Senior Sean Watson (Howard JC) and juniors Emanuel Mayben (Hudson Valley CC), D.J. Rivera (St. Joseph's) and Malik Alvin (Chipola College) are well-traveled, experienced players who are highly motivated to make their final collegiate stop at Binghamton memorable. The addition of that quartet, plus 6-foot-9 transfer Theo Davis (Gonzaga), should help offset the loss of BU's top three scorers (Lazar Trifunovic, Mike Gordon, Richard Forbes), top rebounder (Trifunovic) and point guard and team leader (Gordon). In all, Binghamton lost 63% of its scoring and 54% of its rebounding from 2007-08.

"We wanted to get better wing players and better back players because when you lose a player like a Mike Gordon or a Richie Forbes, you lose a lot," Broadus said. "I had a vision of bringing in really good guards and really good wing players and I think we have a pretty good group heading into the season."

With the athleticism of the newcomers, Broadus is hoping to turn up the defensive pressure after the Bearcats ranked seventh out of nine America East teams in field-goal-percentage defense (44.6%) last season.

"We have a lot of similar bodies and should be defensively stronger than last year," Broadus said. "We'll bring it with a tougher mentality and try to wear teams down."

Junior Emanuel (Tiki) Mayben inherits the starting role at point guard with the graduation of four-year standout Mike Gordon. Mayben, a one-time Syracuse recruit and former starter at UMass, is a sturdy 6-foot-3, pass-first guard who racked up impressive numbers last year at Hudson Community College (19.9 ppg., 9.6 apg). Back at Troy High School, Mayben was rated the nation's ninth-best point guard (21.9 ppg., 10.0 apg.). He was a freshman starter at UMass and led the entire Atlantic-10 in assists deep into the season.

"Tiki will be our leader on the floor," Broadus said. "His court vision is incredible. He is more of a set-up guy than Mike (Gordon) was. Tiki wants to get his guys the ball. He's skilled enough and needs to make sure he does all the things to take us to the next level."

Senior Dwayne Jackson and sophomore Chretien Lukusa are solid choices at the shooting guard position. Jackson, one of two four-year veterans on the team, averaged 8.5 points in just over 23 minutes per game last season. He bumped that average up to 10.5 ppg. against America East opponents, scored 15 or more points four times and was a three-point threat with 43% shooting from beyond the arc in league play. Jackson also was a crucial zone-buster on the perimeter, pouring in 24 points against the zone at Hartford and adding a career-high 26 points in a win over Maine.

Lukusa is a solid defensive-minded player who benefited from big minutes as a freshman. He started 19 of 28 games and averaged 26 minutes and nearly six points a game in conference action. Lukusa played for Canada's Junior National Team and his poise and leadership have impressed Broadus.

Newcomer Malik Alvin brings an additional element to the backcourt: blazing speed. Last season Alvin played for Chipola College (Fla.), one of the top junior colleges in the nation. As a freshman, he started 20 games at Conference USA member UTEP and contributed 8.0 points and a team-high 4.4 assists per game.

"He's got a chance to be special," Broadus said of Alvin. "I didn't realize he was that good. He's fast, can shoot and is a big-time defender."

Alvin's fellow Philadelphia native and childhood friend D.J. Rivera was a prized recruit and the St. Joseph's University transfer will be one of the cornerstones for the program in the next two years. Rivera received an NCAA hardship waiver and can play immediately. He averaged 5.6 points for a Hawks team that won 21 games and advanced to the NCAA tournament last season.

"D.J. is critical to our success," Broadus said. "He is a tough, hard-nosed defender and can get to the basket. He'll guard the best player on every team we play."

Sophomore Brandon Herbert and junior David Fine should also provide some minutes at guard. Like Lukusa, Herbert gained valuable experience as a freshman, earning nearly 18 minutes a game in league play. A solid outside shooter, Herbert scored eight or more points four times and shot nearly 40% from beyond the arc.

Fine sat out last season after transferring from Jacksonville University, where he averaged 10 minutes as a freshman. He is a smart player who can run the offense.

Walk-ons Chad Henry and Matt Mullins round out the backcourt.

Newcomer Sean Watson is the pure scorer the Bearcats have been missing in recent years, and the senior transfer will have ample opportunity to light it up on the wing. He averaged 22.1 points for Howard Junior College last season, shooting a lofty 59% from the field. Back a few years, Watson was projected to be a starter for Montana in the Big Sky Conference, but wound up scoring 1,043 points in two seasons at Howard.

Watson's game might remind BU fans of former first team America East all-star Andre Heard, who starred for the Bearcats from 2004-06.

"Sean is a skilled player who can score in various ways," Broadus said. "He's the type of kid that when you can't get a basket, you put it in his hands and he'll figure out how to score."

Senior captain Reggie Fuller returns for his second and final season, and his blue-collar, competitive nature and charismatic personality have made him a fan favorite. Last season, Fuller contributed 8.1 points and 6.9 rebounds in league play, and his

work ethic was visible across the stat sheets. He led the team with 34 blocks and twice recorded five steals in a game.

"Reggie is our anchor," Broadus said. "He has the ability and the know-how, and he's been through it before. We'll need him to control the boards to be successful."

Sophomore Moussa Camara is a long and quick perimeter player who played well early in his freshman season. Camara, 6-foot-5, earned starts in six of his first seven games and hit for double-figures twice, including a 14-point performance against Quinnipiac. He then started two of the final five games to end the season.

Six-foot-11 senior center Jaan Montgomery has continued his steady improvement under the tutelage of BU assistant coach Julius Allen, and Broadus is hopeful his best is yet to come in 2008-09. Montgomery's minutes and production increased toward the end of season, and he tallied six points and seven rebounds in a career-high 20 minutes against Vermont in the America East quarterfinals.

Six-foot-9 Gonzaga transfer Theo Davis will be eligible in late December and will give Broadus another big body down low. Davis was a highly-touted scholastic player at Cardozo High in Queens, where he averaged 17.2 points, 15.3 rebounds and 7.7 blocks as a junior. After missing his freshman season at Gonzaga due to a shoulder injury, Davis played sparingly last November before leaving school to be with his family in Ontario.

Freshman Kyrie Sutton is another 6-foot-9 body with great upside. He averaged 10.6 rebounds for Boys & Girls High as a senior, and Broadus believes he could push for minutes right away.

With all the newcomers, gauging Binghamton's skill level and team chemistry is difficult, but Broadus will rely on several of his veterans to keep a cohesive unit.

"Reggie, Jaan and Dwayne will be our leaders early on because they are the most experienced players," Broadus said. "They have been here and been through it. We have a lot of new guys but we are going to start off leaning on them." Schedule features trips to New Orleans, Utah, games against Rutgers, GW

The Bearcats' 28-game schedule has a new look to it, as BU will play six teams that weren't on last season's slate. In addition, Binghamton will face challenges from Conference USA and Big East opponents as well as two top-115 RPI foes.

The team will be at home for its season opener for just the second time in the last six years. After playing a home exhibition game against Buffalo State on November 14, BU will begin its season by hosting Mansfield on November 17 at the Events Center.

Back-to-back road games at Atlantic 10 member George Washington and Central Connecticut State follow before BU returns to host NCAA independent Utah Valley on November 29. That is part one of a home-and-home with the Wolverines, who have strung together 25 consecutive winning seasons.

The month of December features three straight road games at Quinnipiac (Dec. 1), Rutgers (Dec. 6) and Bucknell (Dec. 9). Quinnipiac won 15 games out of the Northeast Conference last season. Rutgers won 11 games in the demanding Big East, where the Scarlet Knights faced nine NCAA tournament teams and defeated nationally ranked opponents Louisville and Villanova.

A first-time date with Patriot League member Bucknell closes out the road swing. The Bison are coming off a 12-win season, but the program has earned recent national acclaim for NCAA tournament upset wins in 2005 and 2006. Bucknell was the Patriot League runnerup in 2007.

Binghamton will then play three home games in an eight-day span near the holidays. Manhattan (Dec. 20), Rider (Dec. 23) and Marist (Dec. 30) will each make their first visit to the Events Center, with a first-ever trip to New Orleans sandwiched in between. On December 27, BU will face Conference USA member Tulane, which is coming off a 17-win season. The Green Wave have won 17 of their last 22 non-conference home games and return three starters and two of their top three scorers.

The Jaspers' visit is in return for BU's Bracketbuster game at Manhattan last February. The Broncs went 23-10 last season and received a bid to the inaugural College Basketball Invitational. Rider, which edged BU 81-73 in Lawrenceville in 2007-08, tied for the first place in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and had an RPI of 109 — tops among BU's scheduled opponents. Marist won 18 games and advanced to the MAAC semifinals last winter. The Red Foxes won 11 league games and had a final RPI of 115.

In all, BU will face opponents from seven different conferences.

The Bearcats open their 16-game America East schedule on January 3 at Maine. Binghamton then hosts Stony Brook on January 5 in its first home conference game.

The January 31 home game against Maine will mark the five-year anniversary of the Events Center.

"We want our non-conference schedule to prepare us for league play and the tournament," Broadus said. "Hopefully we can get some more victories and gain some momentum before the America East schedule begins."

Moving up America East ladder will be tough

Defending champion UMBC took some hits to graduation, and the Retrievers are expected to drop back closer to the next rung of contenders, which should include 2008 runnerup Hartford, Vermont and Boston University. The top tier of the conference appears to be stronger than in recent years and the Bearcats will have to match that improvement in order to better the team's 9-7 mark and secure another top-half finish.

"This conference is strong from top to bottom," Broadus said. "There are no easy nights. There are a lot of good players and coaches. I think Vermont is the top team, and Hartford and UMBC will still be good. We will have to work hard."

## KEVIN BROADUS, BINGHAMTON UNIVERSITY'S MEN'S BASKETBALL COACH

After orchestrating a three-game improvement in the America East and a resurgence in local support, Kevin Broadus begins his second season as the head coach of the Binghamton basketball program in 2008-09.

The former Georgetown assistant and recruiting whiz quickly put his stamp on the Bearcats' program in 2007-08. The team matched Broadus' intensity and focus, and jumped up two spots in the conference standings while drawing record attendance numbers at the Events Center.

Now with a fresh crop of talented recruits, Broadus is poised to continue the program's ascent to the top of the America East.

At Georgetown, Broadus worked alongside head coach John Thompson III, and the Hoyas' recent national resurgence is a direct result of his recruiting success in the D.C. metro area. Last year's squad went 30-7 and won both the regular season and postseason Big East titles before advancing through the first four rounds of the NCAA tournament to the Final Four. The 2005-06 team went 23-10 and reached the NCAA "Sweet 16" and the 2004-05 team went 19-13 and advanced to the NIT quarterfinals.

Broadus was introduced as Binghamton's new head coach on March 26, 2007, just days before coaching Georgetown in the Final Four. Also, in the same month he was ranked No. 6 by online publication hoopscooponline.com on its list of the Top 100 Assistant Coaches in the College Game Today.

Prior to Georgetown, Broadus was an assistant coach at George Washington for three years. In 2003-04, his Colonials team won 18 games and was selected to the NIT. From 1998 to 2001, he was on the staff at American University and also had coaching stints at University of the District of Columbia (1994-97) and Bowie State University (Md.) (1990-93).

Broadus is known as an excellent recruiter and four of his former recruits are playing in the NBA. Three of his players from his time at George Washington were on NBA rosters in the 2006-07 season. Mike Hall played for the Washington Wizards, Pops Mensah-Bonsu played for the Dallas Mavericks and Danilo 'JR' Pinnock was with the Los Angeles Lakers.

Broadus' most-accomplished recruit is former Georgetown forward Jeff Green. He coached Green over a three-year span in which Green won Big East Co-Rookie of the Year honors, Big East second-team all-conference honors and the Big East Player of the Year award. Green and Broadus' Hoyas had a 30-7 record in 2006-07 and made it to the NCAA Final Four. Green was drafted fifth overall in the 2007 NBA draft by the Boston Celtics and was involved in a draft day trade, shipping him to Seattle.

Broadus earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Bowie State in 1990 and went on to receive his master's degree in counseling from UDC in 1995.

He was a three-year letterwinner at Bowie State, earning conference all-rookie honors in 1984 and leading the team in scoring as team captain in his senior season. He played his first collegiate season at Grambling University in Louisiana. Broadus attended Dunbar High School in Washington, D.C., and Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Spring, Md.

In addition to his college coaching résumé, Broadus has worked as a summer camp coach and counselor for both the Philadelphia 76ers and the New York Knicks. He also served four years as a research assistant at the National Institute of Health in Bethesda.

Broadus and his wife, Belinda, have four children: Nicol (24), Milan (15), Paris (14) and Kevin Jr. (12).
