STORY LINES

• Binghamton (6-5-1, 1-1-0 AE) is coming off a 1-0 loss at Stony Brook last Saturday. The Bearcats are 4-2-1 in their past seven games and have recorded three shutouts during that span. Senior back **Kyle Kucharski** leads the squad with two goals, six assists and 10 total points. Senior goalkeeper **Jason Stenta** has saved a pair of penalty kicks in the past six games.

• Boston (7-4-2, 1-2-0 AE) lost 3-1 at Hartford last Saturday night. Junior forward Aaron O'Neal, who leads the Terriers with eight goals, got their lone score in the game against the Hawks. Prior to this past week, the Terriers were ranked as high as No. 15 in the nation.

• Boston leads the all-time series against Binghamton 4-2-2. Last season, the Terriers beat the visiting Bearcats 1-0 in the America East title game. Binghamton's last win in the series was a 2-1 overtime decision at the Bearcats Sports Complex on Oct. 10, 2007. At home, the Bearcats are 3-0-2 all time against Boston.

• Binghamton and Boston have combined to win four of the past six America East championships. The Terriers also defeated the Bearcats in the 2004 conference title game. Binghamton, however, has won the America East crown in 2003 and 2006.

PAUL MARCO

HEAD COACH • EIGHTH SEASON • WEST VIRGINIA (1991) • 2007 AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE COACH OF THE YEAR



Paul Marco is in his eighth season as the head soccer coach at Binghamton University. Under his guidance, the Bearcats have been transformed from a team that won just two

games the year before his arrival into a rising power on the national scene. Marco has led Binghamton to two America East Conference titles (2003 and 2006), two America East regular season titles (2006 and 2007) and a conference-record six consecutive appearances in the America East championship game (2003-present).

As the Bearcats have made their place among the elite squads in the conference, they have also gained attention in the national polls. In four of the past six seasons, Binghamton has either received votes or been ranked in both the NSCAA/adidas and College Soccer News weekly polls.

Under Marco's guidance, the Bearcats have excelled just as much in the classroom as they have on the playing field. The 2007 team posted the highest combined GPA in the nation (3.37) out of over 200 programs. The

Binghamton 2005 squad had the third-highest combined GPA among all NCAA Division I men's soccer programs (3.30) and the 2006 team was ranked fourth (3.26). Individually, Binghamton has had one COSIDA Academic All-American and eight NSCAA Scholar All-Americans since Marco became the head coach.

Recruiting top-notch players has been a major key to Marco's quick success at Binghamton. Including this season's recruiting class, he had landed four NSCAA High School All-Americans, four Junior College All-Americans and several international players who have been instrumental the past five seasons.

Prior to his arrival at Binghamton, Marco was the head coach at West Virginia from 1996-2001. During his tenure, he guided the Mountaineers to a record of 47-62-4. His best season was in 1999, when West Virginia went 13-5-1 and received the third seed in the Big East Championship tournament. That year, Marco was named the Big East Coach of the Year. In addition, Marco's 1998 team also advanced to the conference tournament, posting an 11-8-1 mark.

Before taking over the head coaching reigns in 1997, Marco served as the Mountaineers' assistant coach from 1992-95, helping lead the program to an Atlantic 10

conference championship and NCAA tournament berth in 1992.

A former Division I player for West Virginia, Marco led the program to one of its finest seasons in school history in 1990. His 12 points steered the team to a 12-5-1 record -the best mark in 23 years.

In 1991, Marco graduated cum laude from West Virginia with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He is teacher certified in grades K-12. Marco also received his master's degree from the University in 1994 in physical education/athletic coaching.

Besides holding a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Advanced National Diploma, a United States Soccer Federation (USSF) "B" License, Marco has been a member of the NSCAA national staff for 13 years. Four years ago, he was promoted to the NSCAA Senior Staff. In that capacity, Marco has taught various levels of the NSCAA academy curriculum courses, and has published numerous articles. He also served as vice president of the Big East Soccer Coaches for three years.

Marco and his wife, Sheryl, have two children. They reside in Endicott.

Binghamton and Boston University have combined to win four of the last six America East Conference titles. The Terriers defeated the Bearcats in the 2004 finals as well. Binghamton, however, defeated Boston in the 2006 semifinals en route to its most recent conference championship.

Boston University garnered all seven possible first-place votes. Albany earned the other one.

Men's soccer posts highest GPA in the nation during 2007-08 academic year

The Binghamton men's soccer team posted the highest team GPA among over 200 NCAA Division I programs during the 2007-08 academic year. The results were posted by the NSCAA.

The Bearcats attained a cumulative GPA of 3.37 in 2007-08, their highest ever as a Division I program. Among Division I schools, the Bearcats finished ahead of second-place Dartmouth (3.34), which was the top Division I school last season.

The 2007-08 academic year marks the third consecutive time that the Bearcats have ranked among the top four Division I programs in the nation in terms of their overall GPA. During 2006-07, Binghamton was fourth with a 3.26 GPA and the preceding year, it was third with a 3.30 team GPA.

Bearcats rank No. 20 in the nation in home attendance during 2008 season

In 2008, the Binghamton men's soccer team was ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in terms of average home attendance. During the season, the squad averaged 1,115 fans per game, which was No. 20 in the nation.

Binghamton had seven home games during the 2008 season, including an America East quarterfinal game against New Hampshire on Nov. 8. Against Vermont on Oct. 18, a sellout crowd of 2,534 fans watched the Bearcats beat defending America East champion Vermont 1-0. That game was also aired in the Binghamton area by Time Warner Sports.

In 2007, Binghamton ranked No. 21 in the nation with 1,299 fans per game. Included among the eight home dates, however, were both the America East semifinal and championship game which drew a combined total of over 3,000 fans.

Freshman forward **Jake Keegan** scored his second goal of the season, but Binghamton settled for a 1-1 tie against Rhode Island before a sold-out crowd of 2,604 fans at the Bearcats Sports Complex on Saturday night. The crowd was a facility record and the second-ever sellout in the three-year history of the Bearcats Sports Complex.

Down 1-0, Keegan finished off a cross from senior back **Kyle Kucharski** in the 59th minute of the game. He headed the ball into the left corner of the net. For Kucharski, it marked his team-high fifth assist of the year.

Ten minutes earlier, Rhode Island broke out on top on an unassisted goal by Kevin Shaw in the 49th minute. It was his first goal of the year.

Binghamton outshot Rhode Island 17-12 but could not get the game winner down the stretch. The Bearcats hit the crossbar once in each half.

Oct. 7: Binghamton 2, Albany 1 (OT)

Freshman forward **Adam Whitehead** scored 4:30 into the first sudden-death overtime period, lifting Binghamton to a 2-1 win over Albany in an America East men's soccer game at the Bearcats Sports Complex.

Whitehead's game winner was set up by Kyle Kucharski, who took a free kick from just outside the box. Instead of aiming towards the goal, **Kucharski** passed the ball to Whitehead at the top of the box and the first-year player fired the ball into the net to seal the win. It was his first collegiate goal.

Less than two minutes before Whitehead's game winner, however, Albany had a chance to finish the game when it was awarded a penalty kick. Senior goalkeeper **Jason Stenta**, however, dove to make the save and keep the Bearcats alive. It was Stenta's second save on a penalty kick this season.

Albany broke open a scoreless tie in the 68th when Konner McNamara got a rebound in from close range and drilled it into the net. In the 71st minute, however, the Bearcats got the equalizer when redshirt freshman **Matt Kristek** scored his first collegiate goal. Sophomore forward **Santigui Tounkara** and sophomore midfielder **Ryan Walter** were credited with the assists.

Binghamton outshot Albany 17-14 for the game.

Oct. 10: Stony Brook 1, Binghamton 0

Leonardo Fernandes scored in the 48th minute, leading Stony Brook to a 1-0 win over Binghamton in an America East soccer game on at LaValle Stadium. The victory was the first by the Seawolves over the Bearcats since 2001.

Leonardo's goal was his fourth of the season and was assisted by Wilber Bonilla.

Training in Paradise

Like many of his teammates, past and present, sophomore forward Andy Tiedt played in the PDL this summer to prepare for the upcoming season. Unlike the other players, however, Tiedt traveled to play for a team in the Virgin Islands.

Tiedt found out about the team last year from a friend of his. A friend of his told him he was going to play on the team and asked Tiedt if he wanted to join him.

"These opportunities don't come along every day," Tiedt said. "I wanted to take advantage of the situation. I went down there and it was a beautiful place. We put a lot of work in down there. It was a great experience."

Head coach Paul Marco encourages his players to compete over the summer if the opportunity comes along. When he first heard where Tiedt was going, however, he wasn't sure what to think.

"My first thought was whether (Andy) was going to come back fit," Marco said. "I know that when I go to the Virgin Islands, I don't want to train. I go down there to sit on a beach."

Tiedt definitely trained over the summer. The competition was challenging to him in many ways but he believes the experience helped him immensely.

"The style of play was so much faster than what you see up here," he said. "Obviously it took a little getting used to with the heat being 90 degrees every day. Most of the players I was going up against were able to run all day. It was tough keeping up with them at times but it was good for my game."

One aspect of Tiedt's game that especially improved over the summer was his endurance.

"I put in a lot of hill work," he said. "The ability to keep going during hill workouts is all mental. You want to stop halfway but if you push it out, it kind of coincides with going out on the field and fighting through being tired."

It wasn't all work and no play for Tiedt this summer, especially considering where he was playing.

"I did a little bit of scuba diving down there," he said. "I saw quite a few shipwrecks and it was an amazing time."

Tiedt was named to the America East All-Rookie Team last season. This season, big things are expected from him up front and this past summer helped him raise his game.

"Andy's fitness since he has come back is very good," Marco said. "He is improving every day in training. I am really pleased with how Andy is coming along. He will be a big piece of who we are this year."

Senior Spotlight: Chris Terry

When the Binghamton men's soccer team graduated 10 players from the 2008 squad, new leaders had to emerge from the underclassmen. One senior who has done just that is midfielder Chris Terry. While he may not be as well known by the casual fan, it is pretty evident how much he has already made his mark within the Bearcat program.

"If you know our program, you definitely know how important Chris Terry is to us," head coach Paul Marco said. "He's a guy who is close to everyone on the team. He is one of the most respected people ever to play with us. He has the team-first attitude in everything and anything he does. He has certainly helped us improve in what we do."

In each of the past two years, Terry was awarded the ECAC Merit Medal for having one of the top 10 GPAs of any Binghamton student athlete. He is a member of the National College Athlete Honors Society. On a team full of high achievers, Terry has led the way.

On the field, Terry has been a reserve in the backfield the past three seasons. Still, he has kept the team first and never tried to be the center of attention. Becoming a senior, however, led him to elevate his leadership role on the team.

"We lost a real important group of seniors last year," Terry said. "I have always tried to be involved behind the scenes but this year, with there only being four seniors, it's important for me to step up and help some of these younger guys."

"Last year, with all of the seniors we had, it was difficult for any of the underclassmen to embrace the leadership role," Marco said. "Chris has been leading the team in academics since he has been here but on the field, he has become a better leader through the last 10-11 months."

Terry was a NSCAA/adidas Academic All-Region selection at Central Mountain High School in Beach Creek, Pa. In his senior year (2005) he was an all-state nominee. He chose to come to Binghamton for a variety of reasons that made it seem like the perfect fit.

"For me it was a combination of a very competitive Division I program and a good academic reputation," Terry said. "It wasn't too far away from my family, which is very important as well. It all came together when Coach Marco started recruiting me."

At the start of preseason, Marco was impressed with the way Terry prepared for his final campaign.

"Chris has looked sharp," Marco said. "He has come back very fit. Last spring, we had a lot of one-on-one sessions with him on the field and he has looked very good."

Terry has no regrets about being a part of the Binghamton program. The work ethic and desire to accomplish great things are two traits he has always had. The Binghamton program, he says, operates with the same principles in mind.

"This program reinforces everything I believe in terms of working hard to get to where you want to be," Terry said. "Having other guys as well as the coaching staff wanting to do things the same way has been really important."

Senior Spotlight: Kyle Kucharski

On November 1, 2006, the Binghamton men's soccer team was battling Boston University in the America East semifinals at the old West Gym Field. At stake was a trip to the conference championship game. Since the Bearcats were the No. 1 seed in the tournament, they would host the finals three days later.

The two teams were tied 1-1 after 90 minutes. A pair of 10-minute scoreless sudden death periods followed. Binghamton and Boston then went to a decisive five-round shootout. After five rounds of kicks, however, nothing was decided as each team made all five of its shots.

The match would now be decided by a sudden-death shootout. If one team made their kick and the other team missed, the match would be over. Binghamton would shoot first. Boston would follow.

Head coach Paul Marco called on freshman back Kyle Kucharski to take Binghamton's kick in the top of the sixth round. Instead of showing rookie jitters, however, Kucharski relished the chance to help the Bearcats move on.

"I was excited," he said. "I have always been someone who likes taking the pressure shots. I don't mind stepping up. I didn't think I was going to have a chance to shoot that day but it ended up coming down to me. You get nervous beforehand but once you step up to the ball, it's a matter of doing what you always have done."

Kucharski converted his penalty kick and when fellow freshman goalkeeper Jason Stenta stopped the Terriers' ensuing attempt, the Bearcats clinched their fourth consecutive title game appearance. Three days later, Binghamton won its second America East championship in four years.

Since his freshman year, Kucharski has been a full-time starter on defense. He has also been on the America East Academic Honor Roll each season. Last year, Kucharski even worked as an intern within the Binghamton Athletic Department.

"Kyle is always on top of stuff," Marco said. "He understands what being trustworthy means. It's because he's very organized that he is able to do as well as he does."

Kucharski, however, credits much of his success to the Binghamton men's soccer program. It has helped him grow, both on the field and in the classroom.

"Playing soccer here has absolutely helped me become a better student," he said. "The expectations the coaches have for us stretch far beyond the field. You are not allowed to slip up on or off the field."

Last year, Kucharski's younger sister Taylor joined the Binghamton women's program. The two of them have always had a good relationship and being on campus together has been a help to both of them.

"We are pretty close," he said. "We talk often and try and look out for each other. We may not talk every day but if one of us is having a tough time, we are close enough that we can get together and help each other out."

Heading into his senior season, Kucharski is now one of the team leaders. Marco, for one, has seen a transformation over the past several seasons.

"Kyle has always been a guy who does the right things," Marco said. "But through the years, he has learned that he can have a positive influence on others and play a major role in effecting the team."

This is the first year that the Bearcat Hooligans are a Student Association (SA) Chartered group. With the backing of the SA, Stern is encouraged about the future.

"It's a good thing to be SA chartered because we have more opportunities to grow," Stern said. "We are very thankful that we got this chance."

At the beginning of every season, there is the challenge of trying to make sure the crowd is in tune with all of the cheers. At the start of the games against Syracuse and Colgate, the Hooligan chants started off with just the core members. By the end of the games, however, many fans had caught on to the basic cheers.

"We are trying to get more unified in the stands as opposed to 30-40 people singing in the front rows," Stern said. "We are trying to get sheets out to people so they can see the lyrics to the songs. That way we can get everybody involved and ready to go."

The involvement of the Bearcat Hooligans has certainly meant a lot to the players. Each of them cite the group as a big part of the game day atmosphere.

"They are amazing," junior back Kyle Manscuk said. "I can't say enough about them. It is such an uplifting thing to walk out on the field and see a bunch of guys cheering for you. Not every college has that."

"It's great to see them in the stands," senior back Kyle Kucharski said. "The songs and the chants and all of the support mean a lot to us. The home atmosphere wouldn't be the same without them."

Perhaps the best display of dedication by the Bearcat Hooligans came after Binghamton's win at Albany in the America East semifinals last fall. When the team returned to campus, they were greeted by the Bearcat Hooligans chanting their songs. Several local TV stations ran the event on their late night newscasts.

"That was amazing," Manscuk said. "I didn't know what to say. I was speechless. It was a great surprise."

With nine seniors on the roster last season, the Bearcat Hooligans were able to come up with cheers for each of them. Now that those players have graduated, however, the challenge for Stern and the Hooligans is to come up with new cheers.

"We have made songs for Kyle Kucharski and Scott Zobre," Stern said before the game against Colgate. "We are going to try them out tonight and see how they work."

Senior Spotlight: Liam Carson

Since 2002, the Binghamton men's soccer team has been in good hands in terms of leadership. Stephen Bruce was the captain from 2002-04, followed by Graham Munro (2005), Kyle Antos (2006) and Barry Neville (2007-08). This season, the honor of wearing the captain's stripe belongs to senior back Liam Carson.

Four years ago, Carson was a freshman at Virginia Intermont College. It was his coach, who played for Paul Marco when he was at West Virginia, that recommended Binghamton as a place to which he could transfer.

"I heard a lot of good things about this place from my head coach down at Virginia (Intermont)," he said. "He played under Paul Marco at West Virginia and he pointed me in the right direction."

In his one year at Virginia Intermont, Carson got to know Darren McAllister, who like him, hails from Scotland. The two hit it off right away and McAllister guided Carson through a transitional first year. In 2007, McAllister also came to Binghamton.

"We clicked right away with both of us being from Scotland," he said. "(Darren) took me under his wings, showed me the ropes. We have friends ever since."

If Carson's freshman season was an adjustment at Virginia Intermont, then his first road trip at Binghamton was a crash course in dealing with adversity. Against Maryland in the opening weekend of the 2006 season, Carson got called for a red card. On the ensuing trip back to Binghamton, the bus broke down in Harrisburg and the Bearcats had to wait over three hours for a new bus to pick them up. The team finally arrived back on campus at 7 am the next morning.

"It was an eventful weekend for me with the red card and the bus," he said. "It was a nightmare."

It was during those hours waiting for the next bus, however, that Carson began to bond with the rest of the team. He realized then how close the squad was.

"When we were stuck waiting for the next bus, I spent that time getting close to some of the players that I hadn't known before," he said. "It was a bonding session for the team. We stuck it out through adversity. We got through it together."

Carson was to have graduated last season but a season-ending injury after just two games forced him to take a medical redshirt in 2008. During the season, Marco noticed several factors which helped Carson bounce back.

"His own personal desire and self-discipline helped him get through that period," Marco said. "Liam's self-discipline is through the roof. He is also very connected with the team and had some teammates who were very encouraging through last season."

Carson's leadership on the team is unquestioned but it is his ability to listen which has made him the player he is now.

"Liam has the ability to reflect on his performance, the team's performance and the feedback that he has been given," Marco said. "He is then able to apply it. That really shows a sign of growth."

As for Carson, he is just as complimentary of Marco, as well as assistant coach John Scott.

"Paul and John know their stuff," Carson said. "Their knowledge and records speak for themselves. I have learned a lot from them both on and off the field."

With the 2009 season just two games old, Carson is focused on closing out his career on a strong note. He is able, however, to reflect on how being a part of the Binghamton program has helped him grow both as a player and a person.

"I have definitely learned a lot of life skills being a part of this program," Carson said. "I am more organized and have been on top of things. I have nothing but good things to say about my time here."

A Silver Lining

While Binghamton's overtime loss to Gonzaga on Friday was a bitter pill to swallow, the performance of Yusuf Yusuf was a great moment for a player who has battled through injuries during much of his career. One of the most respected players on the team, the junior back tallied his first goal since 2007.

The Bearcats are loaded with players who care deeply about the program and want everyone to reach their full potential. According to the coaches and players, Yusuf is at the top of that list.

"Yusuf is a very hard worker and is always trying to do or say something to help the team do better," head coach Paul Marco said. "We have a lot of guys who are team-first guys and Yusuf is right up there with the best of them."

For Tomko, the motivation for his game-changing blast came from Yusuf, who had been encouraging him to trust his shot regardless of the range.

"Yusuf has been telling me during training just to strike the ball when I have a pretty good shot," Tomko said after the win. "I had the ball and had space from the defenders so I decided to give it a try. With a little luck, it went in."

"I definitely thought he had a good chance to score from that distance," Yusuf said afterwards. "I've kept telling him that during training."

Although he did not play in that game against Bucknell, Yusuf definitely made an impact on the game.

"Yusuf is a great guy who is always willing to put someone in front of him to lend a helping hand," senior goalkeeper Jason Stenta said.

This season, Yusuf he worked his way back into top condition. As a result, his playing time has increased.

On Friday against Gonzaga, Yusuf took matters into his own hands. In the 65th minute, with the Bearcats trailing 1-0, he beat the Zags' goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation to tie the game.

"Now that Yusuf is able to play, it is great to see how he is impacting the team," Kucharski said.

On Sunday against UC-Davis, Yusuf made his first start of the season. While he will continue to help the program off the field, he will now be in a position to make as much of an impact on it.

He Did It Again

With all due respects to Whitehead, the play of the game had to be Stenta's save of a penalty kick taken by Ian Peach in the 93rd minute. It was his second penalty kick stop this season (the other came against Cornell on Sept. 23).

For Stenta, his ability to stop penalty kicks dates back to his freshman year. In his first season as the Bearcats' starting goalkeeper, Stenta spent time with head coach Paul Marco developing ways to become good at stopping penalty kicks.

"In 2006, I spent a lot of time with Coach Marco working on penalty kicks," he said. "He gave me a couple of ways to read shooters. I just keep using that in the back of my mind and keep going forward from there."

"We spent a tremendous amount of time together back (in 2006) trying to read (penalty kick) situations," Marco said. "Right now, penalty kicks may favor the shooter, but not when you have Stenta in goal."

Stenta's teammates also have little doubt about his ability to come through under the pressure of a penalty kick.

"We got a lot of confidence in Stenta," redshirt freshman forward Matt Kristek said. "He is the best goalkeeper I have ever seen. I am so glad he is on our side and not the other."

A Night of New Heroes

A trio of first-year players played major roles in the Bearcats' win over Albany. Whitehead got the game winner, Kristek got the game tying goal and sophomore forward Santigui Tounkara got an assist on the first goal.

Kristek and Tounkara were inserted as substitutes right after Albany took a 1-0 lead in the 67th minute. It took them less than four minutes to deadlock the game.

"When Coach Marco put me into the game, I knew there wasn't much time left to tie the game up," Kristek said. "It feels great to be able to help the guys out by getting that goal. I am (appreciative) to get the chance."

Wednesday's game was special for Kristek in more way than one. Not only did he score his first collegiate goal but he did it in front of a few very special fans.

"My brother got to come to a (Binghamton) game for the first time," he said. "He was here with his girlfriend. I'm so glad I could score for him."

Tounkara, meanwhile, is also starting to progress in his first season at Binghamton. A transfer from San Diego State, he struggled with injuries earlier in the year. Now, however, Tounkara is thankful not only for being able to play but also for the teammates who have embraced him since he arrived on campus.

"This team has been like a big family to me since I got here (in August)," he said. "I was having trouble with injuries (back in September) but tonight it felt great to (contribute)."
